This Scout Camporee will follow the rules of the Guide to Safe Scouting. At least one unit leader must be **IOLS & Hazardous Weather Trained, and all adults must be Youth Protection trained**. Additionally, all adults should know and follow the guidelines in "[Guide to Safe Scouting](http://www.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/34416.pdf)" (<http://www.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/34416.pdf>) and all Scouts must follow the buddy system. All participants must follow the Principles of Leave No Trace. The Camporee is open to all Mawat/Orange District Boy Scouts. Units outside the our Districts are also welcome to attend as well. However, we need to know in advance which units are planning to attend. In addition, we are encouraging scouts to invite a friend that maybe interested in Scouting to attend this Camporee.

REGISTRATION AND FEES

Advance Registration:

In addition to the benefit of a discounted fee, advance registration for this Camporee is ***strongly recommended***. The Units which register in advance should find themselves with a much smoother Friday night check-in and be able to request a site. All requests will be honored on a first come basis. Mawat District units which do not register in advance can still register at Friday night check-in and participate in the Camporee but will have to pay the full registration price. **For advance registration rates, the pre-registration must be completed online no later than Tuesday morning April 30th and the form sent to Council**

Registration Fees:

The discounted fee for this Camporee is \$10 for all Boy Scouts, guests, and adult leaders **IF** the unit is registered in advance; \$15 for all Boy Scouts, guests, and adult leaders if the unit is **NOT** registered in advance. The Camporee fee will cover a Camporee patch for each paid participant and all Camporee operational costs. Additional costs for participants, over and above the Camporee fee, will be their food costs and goodies which will be for sale during the day Saturday at the Trading Post in the admin building.

Camporee memorabilia: We are offering an awesome "Traditional Chefs hat with camporee logo.

There will also be T shirts for more conventional folks both can to be pre ordered by April 5th 2013

We are encouraging units to pre-order hats and shirts as part of registration to insure we have enough for all. Hats will be limited at the trading post so if you want to make sure you get one pre order is the way to go.

The Pre-Order form is located on the web based registration page.

Advance Registration is completed online at the District Web site. The link will be posted on the Web at www.durhamscouts.org by April 1st 2013. Once completed the registration form must be printed out and mail it with payment to the Council Office.

Tour Plans and Medical Forms:

Units should remember, as with any camping trip, to file a tour plan with the council and bring along medical release and health history forms for each of their participants. Camporee staff will not be checking for these, but if one of your participants is injured, you will need your unit's

medical release and health history form for that participant. The closest medical facility, Parham Medical Center, is 22 miles in Henderson, NC (I-85 and Ruin Creek Road).

Roster Form Required At Check-In:

The SPL or unit leader for each unit checking in on Friday night is responsible for completing and turning in a unit roster form to the Camporee Registration Staff. The On-Site Registration Form is located in Appendix C.

Participation of Cub Scouts and their Families:

There will be Cub Scout camping at Camp Campbell, We will use sites 1 and 2. The fee is 5 dollars per person and there will be a port a pottie and privy and flush toilets in admin. Flush toilets are for females only. Dens are also welcome to come up and tour camp during the day on Saturday.

Cub Scout activities for Packs that would like to camp are to be arranged by their own unit. Camporee activities are available for viewing but are not age appropriate for cubs. Campbell has a lot of shoreline that is great for fishing and has short hiking trails through camp. They can visit the Trading Post and buy a patch, a Chef hat, and other items. There will be no charge for Dens visiting during the day.

Webelos II are welcome to camp with their Troops. Make sure and set expectations that the attention of the Boy Scouts in the Troop may be focused on the camporee and not on participating fully with the Webelos Scout during the weekend. And the activities will be geared to provide challenges to Boy Scouts. For more information please read the following web link with content from the Webelos leader guide:

According to the "Guide for Safe Scouting" the rules for Webelos camping with the Troop are as follows:

A Webelos Scout may participate in overnight den camping when supervised by an adult. In most cases, the Webelos Scout will be under the supervision of his parent or guardian. It is essential that each Webelos Scout be under the supervision of a parent-approved adult. Joint Webelos den-troop campouts including the parents of the Webelos Scouts are encouraged to strengthen ties between the pack and troop. Den leaders, pack leaders, and parents are expected to accompany the boys on approved trips.

Registration and Participation of Adult Leaders, Parents and Siblings:

Per BSA requirements, at least two adult leaders are required to register and attend with each unit, and to be present during the entire Camporee. Other adult leaders, parents and siblings of registered Boy Scouts are invited to register and attend, at the same registration fees set forth above. Parents, adult leaders and siblings are allowed to participate in all Camporee activities as time permits; giving first preference at all times to registered Boy Scouts and guests. Siblings must be under the supervision of their parent(s) at all times during the Camporee. All **paid and registered** guests, adult leaders, parents, and siblings, will receive a Camporee patch and are eligible for Camporee awards.

DIRECTIONS TO CAMP CAMPBELL AND FRIDAY NIGHT CHECK-IN

Directions to Camp Campbell appear in **Appendix D** of this Guide. All Troops, whether or not registered in advance, will go through a check-in process on Friday evening at Camp Campbell. Check-in will take place between 4:00 PM and 9:00 PM. All Camporee participants must park in the designated parking areas as directed by the Camporee staff.

The Check-In Area will be located at the Adirondack hut which is located in camp where the road splits to go to the waterfront or activity field **Appendix D** for the map. Units which are registered in advance will check in and then be directed by Camporee staff to their assigned campsite.

NOTE: If you have a preferred campsite area, please note it on your pre-registration form and the Camporee staff will do its best to situate you in the preferred campsite.

Units which are not registered in advance will check in, have a campsite assigned to them based on availability and their numbers, and then be directed by Camporee staff to their assigned campsite. If a unit is spread out on arriving (that is, several vehicles for the unit which do not come all together), the designated leader of the unit should come first and complete check-in, and persons in late arriving vehicles will be directed to the assigned campsite for their unit.

For units which ARE registered in advance, the Friday night check-in procedures will consist of comparing actual unit participation numbers to advanced registration numbers and settling up any differences, collecting from the unit leader the Unit Check-In Roster listing all youth participants. For units which **ARE NOT** registered in advance, the Friday night check-in procedures will be the same, except that all payment and settling up will be done as part of check-in, and campsites will need to be assigned for the unit, as space is available.

CAMPOREE ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

In keeping with the “13th Law ” theme of the camporee, the program will center on team events while working together and strengthening the patrol method

Master Activity List

The following activities are planned for the Camporee:

Monkey Bridge – get the whole patrol across as fast as possible

Land navigation course, (Adult advisor Mr Peek Staffed by Crew 476) all events will be tied in as waypoints on a compass course. Each patrol will report to admin after flags to receive the waypoint designation of either A B or C. There will also be waypoints between events with cooking related questions for bonus points.

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- **Canoe course, Adult advisor Mr Pitts**
 - Scout Masters need to ensure all canoe race participating boys are swim certified. Scout Masters should complete the Unit Swim Classification Record in attachment E to turn in at registration. Swim tests administered during summer camp last year will suffice for the camporee. The camporee staff will **NOT** be administering any swim tests at the camporee.
 - **Waterfront events**
 - Canoe buoy race
 - Canoe tug of war
 - Identification on a sheet of sail boat parts, points of a sail, sail rigs. Canoe parts and row boat parts
 - Waterfront knots, know how to tie at least 4 of these knots.
 - Clove hitch, 2 half hitches, Cleat hitch, bowline, wellmans knot, figure 8 knot, carracle bend, sheet bend, reef bend, anchor bend

- **Flapjack Relay:** Staffed by Troop 486

- Each patrol uses a camp stove and cooks a pancake.
The pan is run to one end of the area, and the pancake put on a plate.
The plate is run to the other end of the area, and syrup put on the pancake.
Then plate back again, and PL eats the pancake.
This is a timed event. Score based on total time, relative to other patrols. They will be also scored on cleaning up the workstation after the competition.

- **Utensil-less Cooking:** Staffed by Crew 505. A patrol is given an egg.
They must cook it without using commercial utensils (i.e. pots, messkits, etc). Scoring: points awarded for method, creativity, teamwork, knowledge. Scouts should practice prior to the camporee and bring the items they need with them. Bonus points for eating the egg

- **Boiled Egg Races** – Scouts start by lighting a campstove, then they boil water to cook an egg. When the egg is hard boiled they run a relay race holding the egg on spoons. If you drop the egg and it's not hard boiled enough, you lose! (And the course should be difficult enough to where they WILL drop the egg once or twice.)

- **Make Your Own Ice Cream** –Every Patrol will get a chance to make their own Ice Cream the novel “Kick the Can” method. Each Patrol is required to bring one ‘Large’ coffee can (with a lid), as well as one glass baby food jar. The troop running this event will need to provide the other materials (ice, duct tape, salt, etc.)

- **Blindfolded “Peanut” Butter Sandwich Making** – Each patrol will blindfold one member. In the area, there will be some kind of non allergenic spread, two slices of bread, and a knife to spread it. There will also be obstacles in the way. The challenge is for the blindfolded person to make a “peanut” butter sandwich. The other patrol members cannot touch the blind person or the ingredients, but they can talk to blindfolded person. They will be judged based on time and teamwork. Event staff will come up with suitable peanut butter substitute that does not trigger allergies.

District Feast & Cooking Competitions

The feast is going to consist of foods that have been cooked throughout the day by the scouts and adults. Our day camp tents and some tables will be set up, but units can bring their picnic table they are donating to camp to eat at too.

Each unit must decide how much food to bring, Patrols must bring enough to feed a patrol, and a Crew or Scout unit must bring enough to feed the amount of people in it. It is up to the unit if they would like to bring food on the patrol or unit level. One or the other, both are not required

Cooking Awards

There will be awards for best entree, side dish and dessert. Adults and scouts will have separate awards. Each troop should plan on have entries in all the categories

The cook-off is open to both scouts and adults. Separate prizes will be awarded in both groups for the following two categories: best tasting, best looking. All entries for the Cook-Off must be at the activity field no later than 5:45 PM. They will be judged at 6pm, then shared with everyone as part of the feast.

Note cards will be provided so any ingredients that could cause an allergic reaction such as nuts or shellfish can be noted.

Campsite Inspections

Campsite inspections by the District Commissioners on Saturday are a part of this competition. The Campsite inspection check list is located in Appendix G. We have also included an example Patrol Duty Roster in attachment H. District Commissioners will check to ensure that a Duty Roster is posted.

Land Navigation Course Information:

Camporee participants will be engaging in 'land navigation', which is a test of accuracy and the ability to follow instructions. Crucial decisions will require working knowledge of how to use a map and compass, and the use of good judgment under pressure.

Before registering for the event, there will be a briefing for all participants.

Patrols will proceed independently over a surveyed course that covers several acres of wooded land. Situated around the course are a number of CONTROL POINTS (CPs), which are identified prominently, and will be visible from at least ten yards away. Each control point will show a hanging information tag which will display a serial number, clue or phrase which the participants must record, confirming contact.

There will be some interesting planned stops. These are the venues for demonstrating or testing various skills, such as crossing a rope bridge, and the like. Scouts are urged to pay attention, participate, catch a breath or two, and to move on promptly to the next CP on their list.

Each participating patrol must have in their possession:

At least TWO working and suitable magnetic, non-electronic compasses (at least one of them should have a straightedge and ruler, like the Silva or military lensatic versions).

Ordinary #2 pencils (no pens, please)

Small notebooks (pocket-sized, spiral-bound ones are preferred)

A package of documents will be given to each patrol's PL. This package will contain the necessary instructions, travel card, map and other information.

The usual hike items, including a hat and canteen for each member and a small patrol-level survival kit.

Moleskin and Gumption

Leaders, you can maximize this experience by preparing your scouts beforehand. Don't just tell them how to do something, DO IT WITH THEM. Teach them how to orient a compass to a map, derive an azimuth from a map, how to follow that azimuth in the field, and how to adjust a compass for magnetic declination. In this area, TRUE NORTH differs from MAGNETIC NORTH by about 8°, so make sure they know how to adjust their compasses accordingly. Simply ADD 8° to a magnetic reading to derive TRUE AZIMUTH.

Explain the concept of pace counts; let them determine their individual paces over a measured 100' course.

This will be an exciting and challenging learning experience, and one that will tire the scouts out. The camporee staff knows this first hand, as we were exhausted just setting the course up...

Although all the activities are intended for fun and participation, this will be a competition. Participants will use the patrol method to compete in various activities to accumulate points. Units that accumulate a sufficient number of points will receive an Honor Troop Flag Ribbon. Patrols will also be awarded prizes based on the number of points they accumulate. Details of awards and prizes are located in Appendix F. (Thank you to Keith Savoy for his work in 2011 that this was taken from.)

Saturday Night Campfire

The main activities for Saturday night are the Flag Retreat and Patrol awards, a Camporee Talent Campfire, and the Order of the Arrow Call-Out.

All Scouts and Scouters should start assembling at the large activity field at 7:15pm immediately after the Flag Retreat and Patrol awards in the activity field, units will progress together to the waterfront for campfire. As a part of the campfire, each unit must bring the unit's colors. Camporee staff will provide a flag stand to display their colors. Units must designate a standard bearer for the Grand Entry at the campfire.

The Camporee Campfire will start first, with skits, songs, and other fun stuff. Each unit should be ready to do their favorite skit. Not sure about what skit to do, the MacScouter's Big Book of Skits (<http://www.macscouter.com/Skits/index.asp>) is a great place to start. Units must have their skit approved (i.e. vetted) by Camporee staff. Vetting of skits will be between 3pm and 4:30pm at the Admin building on Saturday. Please, no last minute changes or entry's after skits have been vetted and approved.

Once the Camporee Talent portion of the Campfire is over, the Campfire will be turned over to the Eluwak Chapter of the Order of the Arrow for the formal Tap-Out Ceremony. Cub Packs may leave at this time or they are welcome to stay to observe this very solemn scouting ceremony.

After the OA call out Ceremony, there will be a welcome reception sponsored the by OA for new Ordeal candidates. This will be in the Admin Building and will be open to the new Order of the Arrow candidates and all OA members.

Sunday Morning - Religious Service

We will have a Sunday morning flag raising ceremony and interfaith worship in the large activity field. Each unit should have a Chaplains Aide that is willing and ready to read a portion on the service.

Chaplain Aides should report to the Activity field 30 minutes prior to the service to rehearse the service.

Cleanup and Departure

Although there will be no formal inspection performed by a Camporee staff member prior to your departure, it is expected that your units will live by the outdoor code and use Leave No Trace practices. Trash must be removed as noted above. Please follow these rules (A Scout Is Obedient) and leave your site spotless (A Scout Is Clean).

A brief survey will be available for distribution after the Religious Service on Sunday at the admin building. Patches will be distributed upon return of the survey

Exceptions can be handled on a case by case basis.

GENERAL ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Cooking & Campfires

Units are allowed to have campfires and pits for charcoal cooking within their campsites; however, they must be attended at all times while in use and properly put out or banked when not in use. Appropriate fire circles **MUST** be used. Propane stoves and lanterns are also permitted. Please remember and abide by the **BSA "NO FLAMES IN TENT"** policy.

At Camp Campbell the Army Corp of Engineers states any tree under three inches may be cut down, other laws may apply to protected species.

Weather

Weather will be provided. Camporee held rain or shine. Be Prepared.

Uniforms:

All youth and adult members of BSA should be in proper uniform when appropriate. BSA field uniform should be worn for arrival, OA campfire, worship service, cracker barrels, flag raisings & retreats, awards ceremonies, and departure. "Class B" uniforms may be worn at other times.

Restricted Areas:

Scouts must be on the lookout for these areas. Camporee Staff will mark off known hazard areas with caution tape. Scouts are expected to stay out of those marked areas.

Campsite 14 is unsafe due to a damaged privy and will not be used for this event.

Waterfront:

We have a BSA approved swim director to run the beach area. A canoeing activity is planned as part of the Camporee. Scout Masters should complete the Unit Swim Classification Record in attachment E to turn in at registration. The camporee staff will **NOT** have time to administer any swim tests at the camporee. Therefore, swim tests must be completed prior to the camporee. Swim tests administrated during summer camp last year will suffice for the camporee.

Fishing Conditions:

Fishing can take place anywhere on the lake shore. The Camporee staff will have caution tape set up around areas where fishing will not be permitted. Please respect these boundaries. Boy Scouts can fish as long as they bring a buddy with them. Standard State regulations pertaining to fishing license as required by Virginia will apply. All fishing is either catch-and-release, or catch-and-eat. Participants must bring their own fishing equipment as the camporee staff is not providing any fishing equipment or supplies.

Medical/First Aid:

The Camporee is trying to arrange for a medical doctor to be on-call at the camp to help with first aid emergencies. However, please remember that Day-Campers, Units and Unit leaders, **NOT** the doctor and **NOT** the Camporee staff, will be primarily responsible for first aid and medical care for their participants. If any medical care need arises which requires a visit to a hospital or medical care provider outside of the camp, unit leaders must notify and coordinate

such care with Camporee HQ. If any accident or injury occurs within the camp, scouts must notify both Camporee HQ and unit leaders, to make sure that the medical needs of any victim are promptly met. Camporee HQ will be at the Admin Building. The adult supervisors of day-campers will be primarily responsible for the administration of any first aid.

Community Facilities:

Camporee Campers will be camping in designated wilderness campsites. In each of these campsites, there may be some permanent facilities: some picnic tables, a fire ring, a latrine building, and a faucet with running water. Several units will be in each campsite, meaning that units will be in close quarters and will need to all share the permanent facilities in that campsite (no first-come, first serve). Please practice the Scout Law, and be considerate of your neighbors in the campsites! Unless otherwise notified, do not build any fires outside the designated fire rings. Toilet paper will be placed in each campsite privy by Camporee Staff.

Please keep port a johns clean and neat, intentionally vandalizing the port a johns will be grounds for dismissal from the camporee.

No Scouts are to enter the Admin Building without the express consent and supervision of adult leadership, this includes the bathrooms, port a johns and pit toilets are available for Scouts to use outside.

The flush toilets are reserved for the female Scouters and family members attending Camporee and family camping with our packs.

Order of the Arrow Trading Post:

The Order of the Arrow (OA) will run an "trading post" where snacks, beverages, additional patches, and T shirts or Chefs hats can be purchased. We will also be selling the leftover shirts from our 2012 camporee at a big discount.

The location of the trading post will be in the Admin building. Profits from sales at the Trading Post(s) go directly to support the activities of Eluwak and Eno Chapters of OA Lodge 104 and offset costs of your camporee.

Trash

Camp Campbell does have a dumpster on site. Units are expected to practice conservation and recycle the appropriate containers. Units should take their recyclables back home with them when they leave Camp Campbell. There are no recyclable containers on site.

Camp Campbell / Camporee Service Projects

This year we would like to continue a tradition of conducting at least one service project with each camporee.

For Campbell each unit is being asked to bring at least one picnic table to leave at camp.

The table may be painted or inscribed by the Scouts and will be used at the district feast Saturday night.

We also have a work day Scheduled on Saturday April 27th to improve the campsites ahead of our event.

Appedix A hat and shirt example

The shirt will be jade green and the hat will have the same camporee logo as the shirt. The logo will be change to say Mawat Orange instead of Mawat District.

Pre order cost on the hats will be 8 dollars, ten at the event.

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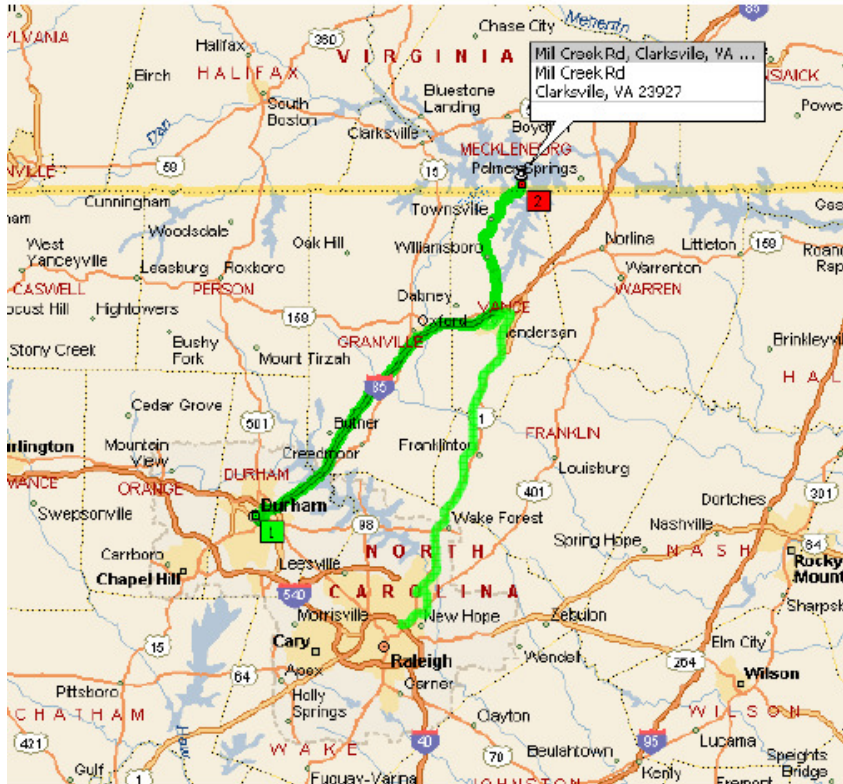

DIRECTIONS TO CAMP CAMPBELL FROM RALEIGH

Camp Campbell is just over the Virginia border on Kerr Lake. To get to Camp Campbell, you drive North of Henderson on NC 39.

Take US-1 (Capital Boulevard) North from Raleigh to Henderson to the NC39 Exit; turning left (North) onto NC 39. This route will take you through greater Henderson where you will meet (and cross over) Interstate 85.

Or take Interstate 85 north from Durham to the intersection (crossover) with NC39, exiting I85 then turning left (North) onto NC39 and crossing over I85.

Proceed North on NC 39 approximately 12 miles to Townsville (city limits, fire department, school on your left)

Continue North on NC39 approximately 1.7 miles north of Townsville; then turn right onto Rock Springs Baptist Church Road. (The road sign points to Henderson Point). This intersection is also marked, obviously, by Rock Springs Baptist Church - a stone church and cemetery which you will pass on your left as you continue North on Rock Springs Baptist Church Road).

Continuing North on Rock Springs Baptist Church Road, at about 3 miles you should encounter the Right-hand turn to Henderson Point...marked by signs. **Do not turn to Henderson Point...Continue North on Rocks Springs Baptist Church Road**

Approximately 1/10 of a mile further, you will encounter and cross the border into Virginia.

Approximately 8/10 of a mile into Virginia, you will encounter Mill Creek Road; a left-turn only marked by the garbage dumpsters also on the left.

Turn left onto Mill Creek Road

Proceed slowly west on Mill Creek Road for 1/2 mile. The gate to Camp Campbell will be on your right.
